SUBJECT: Impact of Abu Ghraib on Retention

In May, you asked about the potential impact of Abu Ghraib on recruiting and retention. In addition to the update on recruiting and retention we provided at that time, we told you that we would include an item on our next survey of active duty members. The specific question we asked on our August survey is below.

## 56. How have the reports of alleged prisoner abuse at Abu Ghraib affected your desire to continue to serve in the military?

- Greatly increased my desire to serve
- Increased my desire to serve
- Neither increased nor decreased my desire to serve
- Decreased my desire to serve
- Greatly decreased my desire to serve
- We found that Abu Ghraib did not affect the desire to continue to serve of 84% of actives duty members; it increased the desire to continue for 9%, and decreased it for 7% of members. The results by Service and by paygrade are attached.


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## Impact of Alleged Prisoner Abuse on Retention Intentions (by Service)

August 2004 Survey of Active Duty Members




